JUNE is the month in which gardens, gardening and the use of gardens change from a Spring to Summer mode:

Summer shrubs and lilies are already starting to bloom and vegetables for summer consumption are growing fast.

However, to gain the most from all plants watering now needs to be upped in frequency and extent, but naturally less so in gardens wisely planted with the more drought-resistant plants and with vegetable growing areas in shade for a good part of the day.

That reminds me, several readers have asked me why the Terra-Cottem soil improvement product is so effective in reducing the extent of watering required. Most important are:
